

Mission of MHCH



To equip congregations, community leaders, and neighbors with practical tools needed to transform their communities to end homelessness, and to stabilize the cost of housing through education, advocacy, organizing, and advisement



Goal of MHCH




To address the root causes of the housing crisis and restore housing justice at the local level through long-term solutions and ensure safe, clean, and affordable housing for low, very-low, and no-income residents of Pasadena and beyond.



Brief History of MHCH



MHCH became a nonprofit in 2018, but its predecessor was a grassroots organization called the Greater Pasadena Affordable Housing Group (GPAHG).



For 20 years GPAHG advocate for housing justice with much success and we are continuing this work.

The Beginning....

Affordable Housing Action (AHA), the precursor to MHCH, was started in the 1990s in the Pasadena office of the American Friends Service Committee (AFSC) to advocate for policies like inclusionary zoning and rent control. AHA changed its name to GPAHG, an informal grassroots group of volunteers who were remarkably effective.



We started as a grassroots organization and that's still our DNA.....

The Beginning....

Since GPAHG became incorporated as Making Housing and Community Happen in 2018, we now have staff and other resources that enable us to expand our work and be even more effective thanks to our fiscal sponsor, Social Good.

Successes



2001 - GPAHG played a role in crafting and passing the Inclusionary Housing Ordinance which requires developers who build more than 10 units to set aside 15% as affordable, pay a fee or build off site. As of March 2019, this policy has produced over 577 affordable units, with no cost to the city, and helped provide Pasadena's affordable Housing Trust Fund with over \$21 million. These funds have been leveraged to produce and preserve 690 more units. GPAHG also advocated for an increase in the in-lieu fee for developers who prefer to pay a fee rather than build inclusionary units on site.

Inclusionary Zoning....

Is a planning tool that allows municipalities to require that new developments include affordable housing



Successes

2002 - The Affordable Housing Action, MHCH's precursor, advocated for rent control in Pasadena, without success. Recently, the Pasadena Tenants Rights Coalition (of which MHCH is a member) successfully passed a ballot initiative making rent control part of our city's Charter.





Successes

2005-2006 - GPAHG successfully advocated for the surplus land of the Desiderio Army Reserve Center under the famous Colorado Street bridge to be used for nine Habitat homes.








Successes Continued

2008 - GPAHG successfully advocated for a Housing Department separate from the Planning Department. This has significantly increased the production of affordable housing in our city.

Successes Continued

2010 - As a result of GPAHG's input, a large apartment complex called Westgate set aside 20% of their proposed 800 units to be affordable for very low income, resulting in 97 units indistinguishable from the luxury units, near Old Pasadena jobs and the metro line—keeping cars off the road. GPAHG met with other residential developers, challenging them to include the 15% of affordable housing units at the lower income levels. In 2018 when a 550-unit apartment complex was proposed in east Pasadena, GPAHG won the unanimous approval of the City Council for that developer to include 15% affordable.



Successes Continued

2012 - GPAHG wrote a 21-page detailed analysis of Pasadena's 2014-2012 Housing Element Draft which ultimately led GPAHG to contact HCD (the state housing) dept) resulting in the draft not being accepted without the city including more deadlines and accountability. Those deadlines gave GPAHG the leverage needed to hold the city accountable to meet them. GPAHG's efforts helped the city to win several awards, declaring this Housing Element as the best in the state as a model for all other California cities.



More successes

2014 - GPAHG was alerted to Fuller Seminary's sale of 197 student housing units to Carmel Partners, a luxury builder, and by so doing breaking their 2006 agreement with the City to keep these units affordable. GPAHG was unable to prevent this development but subsequently, MHCH successfully convinced the city to require that Fuller's Chang Common be used for affordable housing, as required by law. As a result, Fuller decided not to leave Pasadena.



More successes

2016 - GPAHG stopped a proposed anti-camping ordinance which would have criminalized homelessness in Old Pasadena and other business districts.

2017 - GPAHG won a stronger Tenant Protection Ordinance, cleaning up a loop hole that allowed landlords not to pay relocation fees if they put their tenants on month-to-month rental.

Successes Continued.

2018 – Through a change in state law MHCH succeeded in eliminating the minimum property size requirement for Accessory Dwelling Units (Granny Flats) as well as the \$20,000 impact fees. Only one granny flat was built in the previous 15 years because of the city's restrictive ordinance. Today the city embraces ADUs and even won national recognition for its affordable ADU program. This wouldn't have happened without advocacy!

Successes Continued...

2018 - Present Day - MHCH successfully advocated that

- city-owned property at Heritage Square South be used for 69 units of housing for homeless seniors.
- city-owned land next to City Hall be used for 110 units of affordable housing.
- We helped form the Pasadena Affordable Housing Coalition to strengthen the city's Housing Element.
- We were also part of a coalition that successfully advocated for rent control—a cause that GHAHG first advocated for 20 years ago!





In 2018 we successfully advocated that this city-owned site be used for 69 units of supportive housing for unhoused seniors. It is under construction and will open in 2023.





Congregations for Housing Justice

We also successfully advocated for this city-owned site be used for 110 units of affordable housing for seniors with 10% set aside for those experiencing homelessness.

Affordable Housing Doesn't Happen Without Advocacy!

Our ASHA team meets twice a month to plan campaigns to make affordable housing happen. In 2018, this subcommittee successfully advocated for the approval of 69 units of permanent supportive housing for homeless seniors at Heritage Square. We have had many successes since then.

Safe Parking Team



In 2020 MHCH started the first "Safe Parking" program in the San Gabriel Valley area. Our program provides free overnight parking for up to 5 people living in their vehicles along with a security guard, restroom and case management to help them obtain housing and other services. Foothill Unity Center provides support for parkers and has helped 5 to become housed. We are planning to expand this program another site in the San Gabriel Valley. 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N. Fair Oaks Empowerment Initiative





A team of empowered leaders committed to restoring this blighted neglected area of the city, from Howard to Woodbury on N. Fair Oaks to be once again a vibrant and thriving business community that is safe, beautiful and affordable for its residents.

Members of the community partnered with the **Complete Streets coalition to create focus groups that** visually imagined what they wanted, and they identified 15 specific items they hoped the city could address. Today, seven of these requests have been placed in the city's budget to be completed, including signage, more trees and sidewalk repairs. In 2017, the Pasadena City Council unanimously voted to put a \$268,000 traffic signal to help slow traffic and bring safety. Seeing this signal in place has resurrected more hope.

Are you behind on rent because of the COVID crisis or in need of rental assistance to get through an emergency? Join us to find out what resources are available for you.

With California's eviction moratorium scheduled to end on September 30, thousands of families may face the prospect of eviction if they don't receive rental assistance. Our speakers will discuss ways that tenants can access funds to help them through this crisis. Allison Henry, a member of Pasadena's Housing Task Force and a co-founder of the Pasadena Tenants Union and San Gabriel Valley Tenants' Alliance, will speak about how to access federal and state funding for rental assistance. John Bowlin, Community Care Coordinator of Lake Avenue Church, will describe their program and how it helps families stay housed. Ryan Greer, the Eviction Prevention & Rental Assistance Program Director for Friends in Deed, will discuss how his organization helps at-risk families and individuals remain housed, or move in to new housing, without having to move through the homeless management systems currently in place within Pasadena and the greater San Gabriel Valley.

- Donald King, FAIA, President/CEO of Nehemiah Initiative Seattle, His organization helped to pass this rezoning measure and preparing churches to build affordable housing. Architect, pianner and educator with over 50 years of professional experence in the planning and design of community projects, Donald King is currently an Affiliate Professor of Architecture in the Colleg of Bull Environments at the University of Washington.
- Nick Welch, Senior Planner at Seattle's Office of Planning and Community Development, will discuss how his city rezoned religious property for affordable housing. Nick focuses on strategies to address displacement and led Seattle's efforts to expand the production of ADUs. Nick and wrote legislation to facilitate affordable housing on affit-wowed and was instrument in bringing a focus on racial and social equity into Seattle's 2035 Comprehensive Plan by developing the Growth and Equity Analysis.

Marv's Place houses 19 formerly homeless families and is located in a residential part of Pasadena. It has won awards and is seen as an asset to the community. This is one of the places we will visit to learn more about supportive housing.

We don't build affordable housing, but we help make sure it gets built.

- We believe in the Housing First model, so our focus is mainly on permanent housing.
- ► We focus mostly on lower income residents.
- ▶ We are not housing navigators or providers of housing—our primary focus is to advocate for affordable housing and to advise congregations that want to have it built on their underutilized land. We also help people living in their cars to become housed through out Safe Parking program.
